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EXCEPTING THE ALMIGHTY ONE, IS ANY AMONG US ORTHODOX?

"These were their thoughts, but they erred; for their wickedness blinded them, and they knew not the hidden counsels of God; neither did they count on a recompense of holiness nor discern the innocent souls' reward. Wisdom 2:21-22
